(II) EXPLORING WHAT SOME OTHERS HAVE SAID ABOUT GOD

I shall always be convinced that a watch proves a watchmaker, and that a universe proves a God. - Voltaire

Voltaire definitely was not a believer. In fact just the opposite. He was a philosopher and author who lived in the 1700's. He was a primary figure in the movement that came to be called the "*Enlightenment*" where people came to the conclusions that we didn't need God and people would figure out all the problems of people. Nevertheless, he made the observation that things that are created must in fact have a creator.

Imagine taking a watch apart and then putting all the pieces in a bag. Once they are in the bag shake it up and let the pieces fall to the floor. How many times do you think you would have to toss the pieces into the middle of the floor until it reassembled itself as a watch? Right. It would probably never do so. Complex things do not assemble themselves by chance. **SOMEBODY** puts them together and sets them in motion.

Besides even if the pieces came together to function as a watch (which certainly would never happen) somebody still made some very complicated mechanisms that each interact with each other in order to make functioning clock. Anything created requires a creator.

1) This means everything that exists or happens is caused to happen. If there is a universe in which we live it came from somewhere. It could not have just been by chance. Larry Richards has written a wonderful book on this available called, "It Couldn't Just Happen."

1) Don Stewart, co-writer with Josh McDowell said, "We learn something about God and His existence from the way in which we are made. Human beings are rational, intelligent beings – reflecting, in some ways, their Creator. All of us feel the need to worship something greater than ourselves. All of these truths points to the existence of God."

E) THE WATCH AND THE _____

1) We have briefly touched on this one. A man named Thomas Aquinas is said to be the first one to use this argument. Don Stewart continuing on the theme above said this about the watchmaker:

"One of the oldest illustrations that is used to point to design is that of a watch. When a person examines a watch it bears the marks of design. There are a number of parts of the watch that are put together for a purpose. They are

arranged in such a way as to regulate the motion of the watch in order to tell time.

Two things can be inferred from looking at the design of a watch. First, the watch had to have had a maker. Second, the maker had a purpose in mind when designing the watch. We make these conclusions even though we never saw the watch being made, never saw the watchmaker, or had no idea how the work could be done.

In the same manner, when we look at the universe and its intricate design we assume that it had a Designer who wisely made it for a purpose. The belief in a Designer is not affected by the fact that we did not see Him, did not observe His construction, and cannot understand how He did it.”

(II) II TIMOTHY 3:16 SAYS

"All Scripture is inspired by God and profitable for teaching, for reproof, for correction, for training in righteousness, that the man of God may be complete, equipped for every good work."

A. All Scripture is inspired by God. (II Tim. 3:16)

2 Timothy 3:16 (NIV) ¹⁶ All Scripture is (inspired KJV) God-breathed and is useful for teaching, rebuking, correcting and training in righteousness,

Class # 5
“The Bible: God’s Word, Part 3”

(1) HOW CAN I KNOW THE BIBLE IS WITHOUT ERROR?

- (A) 2 Peter 1:20-21 assures us that God's Word is _____
- (B) There are over 300 prophecies in the Old Testament fulfilled during the life and ministry of Jesus. If we analyze the probability of one person fulfilling just eight, the probability would be 1 in 10 with 17 zeros after it! We can understand why Peter declares that the written word of prophecy is more sure.
- (C) 2 Timothy 3:16 tells us that all Scripture finds its origin in God.
- (D) Titus 1:2 tells us that God cannot lie.

(2) DID JESUS BELIEVE THE BIBLE WAS TRUE?

Jesus believed the all of the people of the Bible lived and that the stories of the Bible were true. In fact Jesus affirmed some of the most unusual and controversial accounts in scripture. Take out your Bibles and look up the following scriptures that Jesus affirmed as being true. This study is taken from Net Bible Institute operated free of charge by Don Stewart.

1. The People Were _____

The first thing we find Jesus confirming about the Old Testament is that the people mentioned in its pages truly did exist. They were not mythical characters.

A. Abraham

Jesus confirmed the existence of Abraham. He said:

Your father Abraham rejoiced to see My day, and he saw it and was glad (John 8:56).

B. Isaac And Jacob

The patriarchs, Isaac and Jacob, were real people according to Jesus.

And I say to you, that many shall come from east and west, and recline at the table with Abraham, and Isaac, and Jacob, in the kingdom of heaven (Matthew 8:11).

C. The Queen Of Sheba

The Queen of Sheba actually came to visit Solomon.

The Queen of the South shall rise up against this generation at the judgment and shall condemn it, because she came from the ends of the earth to hear the wisdom of Solomon; and behold, something greater than Solomon is here (Matthew 12:42).

D. Solomon

Solomon himself, the great king, was a historical person.

yet I say to you that even Solomon in all his glory did not clothe himself like one of these (Matthew 6:29)..

E. Elijah

Elijah was a genuine prophet. When asked about Elijah returning to this earth, Jesus clearly said that he was returning.

And He answered and said, Elijah is coming and will restore all things

F. Elisha

The story about Elisha the prophet and Naaman the leper was also confirmed by Jesus.

And there were many lepers in Israel in the time of Elisha the prophet; and none of them was cleansed, but only Naaman the Syrian (Luke 4:27).

G. Zechariah

Zechariah the prophet was also acknowledged by Jesus.

from the blood of Abel to the blood of Zechariah, who perished between the altar and the house of God; yes, I tell you, it shall be charged against this generation (Luke 11:51).

H. Sodom And Gomorrah

Jesus believed that Sodom and Gomorrah were actual cities that were judged by God.

Truly I say to you, it will be more tolerable for the land of Sodom and Gomorrah in the day of judgment, than for that city (Matthew 10:15).

I. Tyre And Sidon

The account of Tyre and Sidon, the cities that were judged in the Old Testament, was confirmed by Jesus.

Woe to you, Chorazin! Woe to you, Bethsaida! For if the miracles had occurred in Tyre and Sidon which occurred in you, they would have repented long ago in sackcloth and ashes. Nevertheless I say to you, it shall be more tolerable for Tyre and Sidon in the day of judgment, than for you (Matthew 11:21,22).

2. The Stories Were _____

As we look at the way Jesus treated the Old Testament, we discover that He assumed the various stories to be factual.

A. Moses Given Circumcision

Jesus stated that it was God who gave the people the rite of circumcision through Moses.

On this account Moses has given you circumcision (not because it is from Moses, but from the fathers), and on the Sabbath you circumcise a man

B. The Manna In The _____

The provision of the manna, given to the children of Israel while they were in the wilderness, was confirmed by the Lord Jesus.

Our fathers ate the manna in the wilderness; as it is written, 'He gave them bread out of heaven to eat' (John 6:31).

C. David Eating The Bread Of Presentation

The story of David and his men eating the bread of presentation was acknowledged by Jesus.

But He said to them, Have you not read what David did, when he became hungry, he and his companions; how he entered the house of God, and

they ate the consecrated bread, which was not lawful for him to eat, nor for those with him, but for the priests alone? (Matthew 12:3,4).

D. David The Writer Of Certain Psalms

Jesus taught that David was the writer of certain of the Psalms.

He said to them, Then how does David in the Spirit call Him 'Lord,' saying

E. Moses Wrote The Law

According to Jesus, the Law was indeed given by Moses.

And Jesus said to him, See that you tell no one; but go, show yourself to the priest, and present the offering that Moses commanded, for a testimony to them (Matthew 8:4).

F. The Suffering Of The Prophets

The fact that the prophets suffered was used by Jesus as an example of how His disciples will suffer.

Rejoice, and be glad, for your reward in heaven is great, for so they persecuted the prophets who were before you (Matthew 5:12).

G. Episode With Lot's Wife

The story of Lot's wife, turning into a pillar of salt, was used by Jesus as an example of not looking back.

Remember Lot's wife (Luke 17:32).

3. Jesus Confirmed Some Of The ---

In addition, Jesus confirmed some of the most ridiculed stories in the Old Testament. It is almost as though He went out of His way to put His stamp of approval on them.

A. Adam And Eve

Jesus believed in the Genesis account of creation - which includes the direct creation of Adam and Eve.

And He answered and said, Have you not read, that He who created them from the beginning made them male and female and said, For this cause a man shall leave his father and mother, and shall cleave to his wife; and the two shall become one flesh (Matthew 19:4-5).

He used Adam and Eve as an example of God's purpose in marriage.

B. Cain And Abel

The account of Cain killing Abel is rejected today in many circles, but Jesus believed it occurred.

from the blood of Abel to the blood of Zechariah, who perished between the altar and the house of God; yes, I tell you, it shall be charged against this generation (Luke 11:51).

C. The Flood In Noah's Day

Was there really a Flood, in the days of Noah, that God sent to destroy the earth? Jesus assumed there was.

For the coming of the Son of Man will be just like the days of Noah. For as in those days which were before the flood they were eating and drinking, they were marrying and giving in marriage, until the day that Noah entered the ark, and they did not understand until the flood came and took them all away; so shall the coming of the Son of Man be (Matthew 24:37-39).

Jesus compared the circumstances surrounding Noah's Flood as similar to those at His Second Coming.

D. Jonah And The Great Sea Creature

Jesus also believed the story of Jonah and the great sea creature literally occurred. In fact, He used it as a sign of His resurrection:

But He answered and said to them, An evil and adulterous generation craves for a sign; and yet no sign shall be given to it but the sign of Jonah the prophet; for just as Jonah was three days and three nights in the belly of the sea monster, so shall the Son of Man be three days and three nights in the heart of the earth. The men of Nineveh shall stand up against this generation at the judgment, and shall condemn it because they repented at

the preaching of Jonah; and behold, something greater than Jonah is here (Matthew 12:39-41).

E. Daniel

Though the authorship of Daniel is often rejected today, Jesus believed that he was a true prophet.

Therefore when you see the abomination of desolation which was spoken of through Daniel the prophet, standing in the holy place (let the reader understand) (Matthew 24:15).

All of these disputed and ridiculed accounts of the Old Testament were confirmed by Jesus as actually occurring. Furthermore, He used certain of them as illustrating some of the most important events in His own ministry - including His resurrection and Second Coming. Since He demonstrated Himself to be God's Son, His testimony settles the matter - these stories did occur.

4. Spoke Of Prophecy Being Fulfilled

Jesus said that certain predictions, recorded in the Old Testament, were fulfilled in His life and ministry.

And He began to say to them, Today this Scripture has been fulfilled in your hearing (Luke 4:21).

This is the one about whom it is written, 'Behold, I send My messenger before Your face, Who will prepare Your way before You' (Matthew 11:10).

And He said to them, Elijah does first come and restore all things. And yet how is it written of the Son of Man that He should suffer many things and be treated with contempt? But I say to you, that Elijah has indeed come, and they did to him whatever they wished, just as it is written of him (Mark 9:12,13).

because these are days of vengeance, in order that all things which are written may be fulfilled (Luke 21:22).

Jesus considered the predictions of the Old Testament as being authoritative - He assumed they needed to be fulfilled.

Conclusion

As we examine the attitude of the Lord Jesus toward the Old Testament we find Him viewing it as totally trustworthy. Jesus believed the people actually existed and the stories literally occurred. This includes some of the most controversial accounts such as Adam and Eve, Noah, and Jonah. He never cast doubt on any of parts of the Old Testament, on the contrary He believed all of it was equally authoritative. Consequently, Christians, to be consistent, should have the same view as Jesus.

Complete Testimony

Therefore, we have the witness of the Old Testament, the New Testament, and Jesus Himself that the Old Testament was inspired by God.

THE ONE TRUE GOD

Christianity has all of its roots in the Old Testament religion of the Jews. It is quite accurate to say that Christianity is actually Jewish.

To fully understand the Jewish religion and its God, YHWH, we must understand something of their background. The first real Jew was Abraham. The Bible informs us that Abraham's father was actually an idol worshipper (Joshua 24:2). All of civilization at this time worshipped a variety of different gods. There were sun-gods, rain-gods, gods of luck, gods of fate, and even unknown gods. In brief, anything that could not be explained by the human mind was attributed to a god. We will call this condition of many gods "pluralistic society." By this we mean that there were many explanations for the universe, meaning and existence and a corresponding god for each answer. This is the environment that Abraham lived in.

Abraham was a regular sort of guy, there was nothing "special" or different about him other than the fact that God decided to "reveal" Himself to him (Gen. 12:1). The fact of the matter is that God "chose" to "reveal" Himself to Abraham for no reason at all except that He decided to. The calling of Abraham was a total act of grace, yet Abraham did choose to follow. When God did choose to reveal Himself, He did so as the ONE TRUE GOD, a personal God with a name and personality, thereby making all other "gods" false and the product of the unaided imagination man. He was YHWH, the King of kings and Lord of lords.

It is important to realize that we also live in a pluralistic society and that God has chosen to "reveal" Himself to us as the ONE TRUE GOD. May this cause us to be grateful and thankful!

ARTICLE ON THANKSGIVING

Thanksgiving Day is observed each year as a national holiday on the fourth Thursday of November (between November 22nd and 28th).

The Historical Events that Created the Holiday

Thanksgiving Day originated with the Pilgrims who settled in Plymouth, Massachusetts in the early 1600s. The Pilgrims were devout Christians who wanted to separate themselves from the established Church of England. In 1620 they emigrated to America to build their own church in a new land so that they could have freedom of worship.

Shortly after the Pilgrim colony was established in Plymouth the English settlers received help from friendly Indians. Samoset, an English-speaking chief from Maine who was visiting Massasoit, a local chief friendly to white men, built a bridge of friendship between the Pilgrims and the neighboring tribe. He also introduced them to Squanto, an Indian who would later be described by the Pilgrim leader as "a special instrument sent of God for their good, beyond their expectation." Prior to the arrival of the Pilgrims, Squanto worked with English traders as an interpreter and even visited England on two occasions. Upon returning from his second visit, he discovered that his whole tribe had died due to a plague. Living with a neighboring tribe, he "adopted" the English Pilgrims and taught them how to survive in the new land.

In April of 1621 Squanto taught the Pilgrims how to plant corn the Indian way, and by harvest time in the autumn they realized they had more than enough corn to get them through the second winter. As their leader, Governor William Bradford declared that a day of public Thanksgiving should be observed in October. The Indian chief Massasoit and ninety of his men not only came for the festivities, they hunted for much of the food: five deer and more than twelve turkeys. The Pilgrims provided the vegetables from their harvest and baked many kinds of fruit pies. Opening the celebration was a prayer by William Brewster, thanking God for providing for all their needs and for the friendship of the Indians. In addition to the meals there were contests of foot races, wrestling and shooting (gun and bow). And, in the end, this initial day of thanksgiving lasted for three days.

In April of 1623 the annual planting of corn was once again underway, but a dry spell in the month turned into a drought that lasted from the third week in May until the middle of July. Conditions were desperate, and according to a Pilgrim named Edward Winslow, they chose "to humble ourselves together before the Lord by fasting and prayer. To that

end, a day was appointed by public authority, and set apart from all other employments." The results were immediate and phenomenal. In the words of Winslow,

But, O the mercy of our God who was as ready to hear, as we were to ask! For though in the morning, when we assembled together, the heavens were as clear and the drought as like to continue as it ever was, yet (our exercise continuing some eight or nine hours) before our departure, the weather was overcast, the clouds gathered on all sides. On the next morning distilled such soft, sweet and moderate showers of rain, continuing some fourteen days[!] and mixed with such seasonable weather, as it was hard to say whether our withered corn or drooping affections were most quickened or revived, such was the bounty and goodness of our God!

Governor Bradford phrased it this way in his account, Of Plymouth Plantation, "And He was pleased to give them a gracious and speedy answer, both to their own and the Indians' admiration that lived amongst them. . . .For which mercy, in time convenient, they also set apart a day of thanksgiving." It is possible that this second day of thanksgiving was observed on July 30, 1623.

The Historical Process that Shaped the Holiday

Long before there was a "National" holiday the various colonies in America observed a day of thanksgiving. The Massachusetts Bay Colony had their first thanksgiving day in 1630 and frequently in following years until 1680, when this observance became an annual festival. Connecticut set aside a day for giving thanks in 1639, and by 1641 it was an annual event. In the colony of New Netherlands (today, the state of New York) the Dutch observed such a day in 1644 and occasionally thereafter.

During the Revolutionary War against England in the 1770s the American Continental Congress appointed at least one day of thanksgiving each year (except for 1777) and encouraged the governors in the different states to observe it in their region. George Washington, the first President of the United States, issued a proclamation that the entire nation set aside November 26, 1789 as a day for prayer and for giving thanks to God. In 1795 Washington appointed another day of thanksgiving, and twenty years later President James Madison did the same thing at the conclusion of the War of 1812 with England.

But the establishment of a national religious holiday of giving thanks to God on one special day each year was largely the result of the efforts of one lady: Mrs. Sarah J. Hale. From 1827 when she was editor of the Ladies' Magazine in Boston, she argued for a national day of thanksgiving. When her magazine consolidated with Godey's Lady's Book, her opportunities for influence increased since this grew to a circulation of 150,000, the largest periodical in America. Writing personal letters to the governors of every state and to the President, she persuaded many of the governors to set aside the last Thursday in November for Thanksgiving. Her efforts for a national holiday finally paid

off when she persuaded President Abraham Lincoln, in the midst of the Civil War, to establish such a day. In her final editorial (September 1863) she wrote these words:

Then he said unto them, Go your way and eat the fat and drink the sweet and send persons unto them for whom nothing is prepared; for this day is holy unto the Lord; neither be ye sorry, for the joy of the Lord is your strength. – Nehemiah 8:10

Thus commanded the inspired Leader of the Jews when they kept the "Feast of Weeks"; in a time of national darkness and sore troubles shall we not recognize that the goodness of God never faileth, and that to our Father in heaven we should always bring the Thanksgiving offering at the ingathering of the harvest?

Wise lawgivers and great patriots have acknowledged the salutary effect of appointed times for national reunions *which* combine religious sentiment with domestic and social enjoyment; thus feelings of benevolence are awakened and gratitude to the giver of all the blessing is seen to be the great duty of life. Owing to the different economy of different churches among Protestant denominations, except the Christian Sabbath, all our religious commemorations are partial and local.

Can we not then, following the appointment of Jehovah in the "Feast of Weeks," or Harvest Festival, establish our yearly Thanksgiving as a permanent American National Festival which shall be celebrated on the last Thursday in November in every State of the Union? Indeed, it has been nearly accomplished. For the last twelve or fourteen years the States have made approaches to this unity. In 1859 thirty States held their Thanksgiving Festival on the same day - the last Thursday in November.

The Contemporary Observance of the Holiday

In America the heart of the Thanksgiving holiday is the Thanksgiving dinner. This is observed not only in almost every home but also by the President at the White House in Washington. In keeping with the association with the Pilgrims and their thankfulness at harvest time the favorite meat is roast turkey, the favorite fruit is cranberries, and the favorite dessert is pumpkin pie. An ancient harvest symbol, the cornucopia or horn of plenty, has also become associated with this holiday.

For some people the emphasis on giving thanks to God for blessings experienced during the year is central to the holiday, but for many the healthy emphasis on family reunion overshadows or replaces the focus on God and His blessing. Thanksgiving has also become a day for parades and football games that some attend in person but most watch on television.

Mark Twain speaking of this land in "Innocence Abroad" (1869) said, "There is not a solitary village, not for 30 miles in either direction. There are a few small clusters of Bedouin tents, but not a single permanent habitation. One may ride for ten miles in one direction anywhere hereabouts and not find ten human beings. A) HISTORY OF CHRISTMAS

In the U.S. we have incorporated many traditions and rituals from many nations due to our melting pot atmosphere

- 1) There is no time given in scripture and you don't find the celebration of the day as a NT practice
- 2) Dec 25 (as Christmas) started 1,662 years ago when Pope Julius I decreed the previously a pagan holiday as a holy day of “Christ’s Mass.”
 - a) Constantine’s conversion lead to Christianizing maybe pagan practices.
 - b) Pope Gregory the Great wanted to transform pagan customs and said, *“It is impossible to cut off everything at once, because he who strives to ascend to the highest place rises by degrees or steps, not leaps...”* And so steps and degrees it was...
- 3) Dec 25 = Pagan birthday celebration of Mithra, the Iranian (Persian) god of mystery
- 4) Dec 25 = Last day of week long celebration practiced in Rome called ‘Saturnalia’ day of Invincible Sun
- 5) A day of dancing; drinking and setting slaves free
- 6) Priests of medieval Europe tried to drown out the merrymakers by clanging the church bells on Christmas Eve
- 7) In Italy (Rome) ‘*carolares*’ would dress as wild animals. By the 14th century they were singing Christmas carols from door to door.
- 8) In 1647 England the Puritans outlawed Christmas. The commoners practiced it anyway and the mayors, marshals and sheriffs went around burning all the greens.
- 9) Mistletoe was an integral part of Norse, German and Celtic ceremonies. If two of the opposite sex met under the mistletoe and didn't kiss they would suffer ill fortune.
- 10) Holly which today speaks to many of Christ’s crown of thorns and blood (from red berries) was then thought to be prophetic and when placed under your pillow you would dream of your future.

11) Christmas tree; Martin Luther or Saint Boniface

- a) Boniface cut down a Druid sacred oak in the 700's in an attempt to convert pagans to Christianity. When he cut it down it crushed everything in its path except for a tiny fir sapling that he said represented a miracle and the Christ child.
- b) Luther = lights to represents stars of heaven
- c) decorated after children go to bed as a picture of a marvelous transformation (Germany)
- d) In New England prior to Revolutionary War paper and wood lighted pyramids were the rage. Many 12 -20 foot ones were placed in the Boston Common.
- e) Evergreen has long been a symbol of immortality in Scandinavia. They would bring it home to appease the spirits.

- a) splashing cups of cider on trees hoping for good fruit in the following year (from England)

WHAT ABOUT OTHER RELIGIONS

We've already seen that Jesus claimed to be and is the only way to God. Yet there are many other religions and cults.

There are four basic tests to compare other religions to Christianity. They are:

- 1) What does the group do with Jesus?
- 2) How is a person saved? In Christianity it is by grace, believing Jesus died for our sins and rose from the dead. You'll see the other cults and religions trust in works.
- 3) What does the group do with the resurrection of Jesus?
- 4) How do they view the Bible?

Review together Biblical Christianity and then find a few groups that interest you and take a comparative look at what they believe about Jesus, the Bible and salvation. Read about them aloud, talk about them and discover together the differences...

Biblical Christianity

<p><i>Key Person Or Founder, Date, Location</i></p>	<p>Jesus Christ. Founded about A.D. 30-33, in the Judean province of Palestine (Israel today), under the Roman Empire.</p>
<p><i>Key Writings</i></p>	<p>The Bible, written originally in Hebrew and Aramaic (Old Testament), and Greek (New Testament).</p>
<p><i>Who Is God?</i></p>	<p>God is triune (one God in the form of three persons, not three gods): Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. Often the title "God" designates the first person, God the Father. God is a spiritual being without a physical body. He is personal and involved with people. He created the universe out of nothing. He is eternal, changeless, holy, loving, and perfect.</p>
<p><i>Who Is Jesus?</i></p>	<p>Jesus is God, the second person of the Trinity. As God the Son, He has always existed and was never created. He is fully God and fully man (the two natures joined, not mixed). As the second person of the Trinity, He is coequal with God the Father and the Holy Spirit. In becoming man, He was begotten through the Holy Spirit and born of the Virgin Mary. Jesus is the only way to the Father, salvation, and eternal life. He died on a cross according to God's plan, as full sacrifice and payment for our sins. He rose from the dead on the third day, spiritually <i>and</i> physically immortal. For the next 40 days He was seen by more than 500 eyewitnesses. His wounds were touched and he ate meals. He physically ascended into Heaven. Jesus will come again visibly and physically at the end of the world to establish God's kingdom and judge the world.</p>
<p><i>Who Is The Holy Spirit?</i></p>	<p>The Holy Spirit is God, the third person of the Trinity. The Holy Spirit is a person, not a force or energy field. He comforts, grieves, reproves, convicts, guides, teaches, and fills Christians. He is not the Father, nor the Son, Jesus Christ.</p>
<p><i>How To Be Saved</i></p>	<p>Salvation is by God's grace, not by an individual's good works. Salvation must be received by faith. People must believe in their heart that Jesus died for their sins and physically rose again, which is the assurance of forgiveness and resurrection of the body. This is God's loving plan to forgive sinful people.</p>
<p><i>What Happens After Death</i></p>	<p>Believers go to be with Jesus. After death, all people await the final judgement. Both saved and lost people will be resurrected. Those who are saved live with Jesus in Heaven. Those who are lost suffer the torment of eternal separation from God (they go to Hell). Jesus'</p>

	bodily resurrection guarantees believers that they, too, will be resurrected and receive new immortal bodies.
<i>Other Beliefs Or Practices</i>	Group worship, usually in churches. No secret rites. Baptism and the Lord's Supper (Communion). Active voluntary missionary efforts. Aid to those in need: the poor, widows, orphans, and downtrodden. Christians believe that Jesus is the Jewish Messiah promised to Israel in the Old Testament (Tanakh). Jesus said His followers would be known by their love for one another.

Scientology

<i>Key Person Or Founder, Date, Location</i>	L. Ron Hubbard (1911-1986). Founded 1954 in California. Current headquarters in Los Angeles, California
<i>Key Writings</i>	<i>Dianetics: The Modern Science of Mental Health</i> and others by Hubbard. <i>The Way to Happiness</i> .
<i>Who Is God?</i>	Does not define God or Supreme Being, but rejects Biblical description of God. Everyone is a "thetan," an immortal spirit with unlimited powers over its own universe, but not all are aware of this.
<i>Who Is Jesus?</i>	Jesus is rarely mentioned in Scientology. Jesus was not the Creator, and not an "operating thetan" (in control of supernatural powers, cleared from mental defects). Did not die for sins.
<i>Who Is The Holy Spirit?</i>	The Holy Spirit is not a part of this belief.
<i>How To Be Saved</i>	No sin or need to repent. Salvation is freedom from reincarnation. One must work with an "auditor" on his "engrams" (hang-ups) to achieve the state of "clear," then progress up the "bridge to total freedom."
<i>What Happens After Death</i>	Hell is a myth. People who get clear of engrams become operating thetans.
<i>Other Beliefs Or Practices</i>	Members observe birth of Hubbard and anniversary of publication of <i>Dianetics</i> . Controversy follows the group world-wide. <i>Time</i> magazine and <i>Reader's Digest</i> have published damaging expose. Various media have reported that church leaders have had indictments and/or convictions for burglary, wiretapping, conspiracy, and other felonies.

New Age

<i>Key Person Or Founder, Date, Location</i>	Based on eastern mystics, Hinduism, and paganism. Popularized in part by actress Shirley MacLaine, 1980s-90s. Beliefs vary.
<i>Key Writings</i>	No holy book. Use selected Bible passages; <i>I Ching</i> ; Hindu, Buddhist, and Taoist writings; and Native American beliefs. Writings on astrology, mysticism, and magic.
<i>Who Is God?</i>	Everything and everyone is God. God is an impersonal force or principle, not a person. People have unlimited inner power and need to discover it.
<i>Who Is Jesus?</i>	Jesus is not the one true God. He is not a savior, but a spiritual model, and guru, and is now an "ascended master." He was a New Ager who tapped into divine power in the same way that anyone can. Many believe he went east to India or Tibet and learned mystical truths. He did not rise physically, but "rose" into a higher spiritual realm.
<i>Who Is The Holy Spirit?</i>	Sometimes a psychic force. Man is divine and can experience psychic phenomena such as contacting unearthly beings.
<i>How To Be Saved</i>	Need to offset bad karma with good karma. Can tap into supernatural power through meditation, self-awareness, TM, and "spirit guides." Use terms such as "reborn" for this new self-awareness.
<i>What Happens After Death</i>	Human reincarnations occur until person reaches oneness with God. No eternal life as a resurrected person. No literal heaven or hell.
<i>Other Beliefs Or Practices</i>	Can include yoga, meditation, visualization, astrology, channelling, hypnosis, trances, tarot card readings, and contact with spirits. Use of crystals to get in harmony with God (Energy), for psychic healing, for contact with spirits, and for developing higher consciousness, or other psychic powers. Strive for world unity and peace, and holistic health.

Judaism

<p><i>key Person Or Founder, Date, Location</i></p>	<p>Abraham of the Bible, about 2000 B.C., in the Middle East. Three main branches of Judaism, each with its own beliefs.</p>
<p><i>Key Writings</i></p>	<p>The Tanakh (Old Testament), and especially the Torah (first five books of the OT). The Talmud (explanation of the Tanakh). Teachings of each branch: Orthodox, Conservative, and Reform. Writings of sages, such as Maimonides.</p>
<p><i>Who Is God?</i></p>	<p>God is spirit. To Orthodox Jews, God is personal, all-powerful, eternal, and compassionate. To other Jews, God is impersonal, unknowable, and defined in a number of ways. No Trinity.</p>
<p><i>Who Is Jesus?</i></p>	<p>Jesus is seen either as an extremist false messiah or a good but martyred Jewish rabbi (teacher). Many Jews do not consider Jesus at all. Jews (except Messianic Jews and Hebrew Christians) do not believe he was the messiah, Son of God, or that he rose from the dead. Orthodox Jews believe the Messiah will restore the Jewish kingdom and eventually rule the earth.</p>
<p><i>Who Is The Holy Spirit?</i></p>	<p>Some believe the Holy Spirit is another name for God's activity on earth. Others say it is God's love or power.</p>
<p><i>How To Be Saved</i></p>	<p>Some jews believe that prayer, repentance, and obeying the Law are necessary for salvation. Others believe that salvation is the improvement of society.</p>
<p><i>What Happens After Death</i></p>	<p>There will be a physical resurrection. The obedient will live forever with God, and the unrighteous will suffer. Some Jews do not believe in a conscious life after death.</p>
<p><i>Other Beliefs Or Practices</i></p>	<p>Meeting in synagogues on the Sabbath (Sabbath is Friday evening to Saturday evening). Circumcision. Many holy days and festivals, including Passover, Sukkoth, Hanukkah, Rosh Hashanah, Yom Kippur, and Purim. Jerusalem is considered to be the holy city.</p>

Hinduism

<i>Key Person Or Founder, Date, Location</i>	No one founder. Many sects. Began 1800-1000 B.C. in India.
<i>Key Writings</i>	Many writings, including the Vedas (oldest, about 1000 B.C.), the Upanshads, and the <i>Bhagavad-Gita</i> .
<i>Who Is God?</i>	God is "The Absolute," a universal spirit. Everyone is part of God (Brahman) like drops in the sea. People worship manifestations of Brahman (gods and goddesses). People are God, but are unaware of it.
<i>Who Is Jesus?</i>	Jesus Christ is a teacher, a guru, or an avatar (an incarnation of Vishnu). He is a son of God as are others. His death does not atone for sins and he did not rise from the dead.
<i>Who Is The Holy Spirit?</i>	The Holy Spirit is not a part of this belief.

Buddhism

<i>Key Person Or Founder, Date, Location</i>	Buddha (Siddhartha Gautama). Founded about 525 B.C. in India. Offshoot of Hinduism.
<i>Key Writings</i>	The Tripitaka (three baskets), which has more than 100 volumes.
<i>Who Is God?</i>	Buddhism is mostly atheistic. Many buddhists do not believe in a God or Supreme Being of any kind. Others speak of the Buddha as a universal enlightened consciousness or as a god.
<i>Who Is Jesus?</i>	Jesus Christ is not a part of this belief. Buddhists in the West generally view Jesus as an enlightened man.
<i>Who Is The Holy Spirit?</i>	The Holy Spirit is not a part of this belief.
<i>How To Be Saved</i>	Goal of life is Nirvana, to eliminate all desires or cravings, and in this way escape suffering. The Eightfold Path is a system to free Buddhists from desiring anything.

Islam

<i>Key Person Or Founder, Date, Location</i>	Mohammed (570-632). About A.D. 610, in Mecca and Medina. Headquarters in Mecca, Saudi Arabia. Main sects: Sunni and Shiite.
<i>Key Writings</i>	Qur'an (Koran), scripture in Arabic. <i>Hadith</i> (Mohammed's words and deeds). Biblical Law of Moses, Psalms, and Gospel of Jesus (the Injil) accepted by Qur'an, but considered by Muslims to be "corrupted."
<i>Who Is God?</i>	God (Allah) is one. God revealed the Qur'an to Mohammed through the angel Gabriel. God is a severe judge (though sometimes merciful) and is not depicted as loving.
<i>Who Is Jesus?</i>	Jesus is one of up to 124,000 prophets sent by God to various cultures. Abraham, Moses, and Mohammed are others. Jesus was born of a virgin, but is not the Son of God. Sinless. <i>What Happens After Death</i>	Resurrection of bodies. Final day of reckoning and rewards. Eternal paradise for those who believe in Islam. Eternal hell for those who reject Islam.
<i>Other Beliefs Or Practices</i>	Followers are called Muslims. Go to mosque for prayers, sermons, counsel. Holy efforts to spread Islam (jihad). Five pillars of Islam: Confess that Allah is the one true God and that Mohammed is his prophet. Pray five times daily facing Mecca. Give alms (money). Fast during the month of Ramadan. Make pilgrimage to Mecca (once in a lifetime).

KNOW WHY YOU BELIEVE
LESSON # 19, 20 21
RESURRECTION: Cornerstone of Christianity

We are moving towards Easter and the subject of our year-long study is “Know WHY You Believe.” We have previously covered WHAT Christians believe, including the resurrection, so now we’ll talk about WHY we believe. Some of the ground we cover will repeat the facts of the resurrection, but over the next couple of weeks we’ll work our way through this article that tells us what the resurrection is, as well as why we believe Jesus rose from the dead.

The best way to approach this study is to have a student read through the article and then stop at each scripture reference having another student read it and then perhaps talking about it for a moment...

The goal of reading together is to have some interaction together as we explore the resurrection of Jesus Christ.

We’ve also provided some tapes for you that you may want to listen to.

Read and explore the article together over the next three weeks and try and get to the end. The week before Easter, we’ll be studying the customs and origin of Easter traditions.

**"... if Christ is not risen, your faith is futile;
you are still in your sins!"
(1Cor 15:17).**

The resurrection of Jesus Christ is an essential doctrine of the Christian faith. But what actually happened in 30 AD? Did Jesus really rise from the dead? Or does some alternate theory best explain what is known about that important year? This article will look at the evidences for the resurrection and evaluate alternate theories.

General Reliability of the Gospels

Before looking at the resurrection itself, the general reliability of the four Gospels included in the New Testament needs to be considered. They accurate records of the life and teachings of Jesus.

First, the writers assert to be writing literal history (Luke 3:1f).

They claim to be either eye-witnesses of the events or to have received their information from eye-witnesses (Luke 1:1-4; John 19:35).

In studies of other ancient documents, historians still abide by "Aristotle's dictum that the benefit of the doubt is to be given to the document itself."

John Warwick Montgomery explains, "This means that one must listen to the claims of the document under analysis and not assume fraud or error unless the author disqualifies himself by contradictions or known factual inaccuracies" (Montgomery, p.29).

It is outside the realm of this paper to present a detailed account of how archeology has confirmed the Gospel records. However, one example that will be important in later discussions will be presented.

Luke records the ministries of John the Baptist and Jesus as occurring during the "... reign of Tiberius Caesar, Pontius Pilate being governor of Judea" (Luke 3:1). He also states that Pilate conceded to the crucifixion of Jesus (Luke 23:24).

These statements are upheld by the Roman historian Tacitus (AD 55-117). He writes, "... Christ had been executed in Tiberius' reign by the governor of Judea, Pontius Pilate" (Tacitus, p.365).

Secondly, the Gospels were all written in the first century. The first three Gospels are traditionally dated between 50-65 AD and the Gospel of John 80-95 AD (Criswell, pp.1327, 1498).

However, some have doubted this first century dating of the Gospel of John:

... radical criticism has attempted to date its composition during the middle or end of the second century. Such a view, however, was decisively refuted by the discovery in Egypt of the Ryland's papyrus fragment, which documents the circulation of the Gospel c. AD 135. The book must, therefore, be dated in the first century, and there is no compelling reason for rejecting the traditional view (Criswell, p.1498).

Given the first century dates, hostile eye-witnesses would have discredited the Gospel writers if they were recording inaccurate histories. However, there is no record of this occurring.

Background Information

Accepting the Gospels as being accurate records for non-supernatural events still doesn't prove the resurrection occurred. For this question, it needs to be ascertained whether any other theory adequately explains all the facts known surrounding the death and burial of

Jesus and subsequent events. Following is a list of some of the points needing explanation.

Death of Jesus Christ:

All four Gospel writers record the crucifixion of Jesus (Matt 27:35; Mark 15:24; Luke 23:33; John 19:18).

The Gospels are also clear in saying Jesus was dead before He was taken off the cross (Matt 17:50; Mark 15:37; Luke 23:46; John 19:30).

John records that a soldier made sure of this fact by piercing Jesus' side with a sword (John 19:34). Mark says Pilate double-checked with the centurion to be sure Jesus was in fact dead before releasing the body (Mark 15:44f).

Josephus was a Jewish historian who lived from 37-100 AD. He also mentions Jesus' crucifixion (Josephus, p.379). This passage has been hotly contested. Some believe the early Christians altered the passage. This belief has arisen because the passage appears too "Christian" for a Jew to have written it. However, an Arabic manuscript omits the questionable passages while retaining the phrase, "Pilate condemned him to be crucified and to die" (quoted in Habermas, p.92).

The Jewish Talmud (70-200 AD) records, "On the eve of the Passover, Yeshu (Hebrew for Jesus) was hanged" (Quoted in Habermas, p.98). "Hanged" is used in the NT to describe crucifixion; so there is no contradiction (Luke 23:39; Gal 3:13).

Lucian, a second century Greek satirist writes of the early Christians that they, "...worship the crucified sage" (Quoted in Habermas, p.100).

So there is Jewish, Roman and Grecian collaborating evidence for the fact of Jesus' crucifixion. In these passages, there is not even a hint that Jesus was taken off the cross before he was dead.

Even if Jesus had been still alive when He was taken off the cross, the chance for His survival would have been slim. In 66 AD Josephus, "Discovered three of his friends being crucified. He asked the Roman general Titus to reprieve them, and they were immediately removed from their crosses. Still two of the three died any way" (McDowell, *Resurrection*, p.49).

Burial of Jesus Christ:

When Jesus' body was taken down, it was bound in linen cloths with a hundred pounds of spices (John 19:39f).

This Jewish burial custom would have included covering the face (McDowell, *Resurrection*, p.92). If He wasn't dead already, the covering of His face and the spices would have snuffed out any flicker of life left.

He was then laid in a new tomb and a large stone rolled in front (Matt 17:60).

The Jews, remembering Jesus' prediction that He would rise from the dead, asked Pilate to provide a guard (Matt 27:62-66).

Greek scholar A.T. Robertson states that the grammar of verse 65 makes it clear that a guard of Roman soldiers was provided, "... not mere temple police" (Robertson, Vol. I, p.239).

A Roman guard consisted of 4-16 men and, "... was probably one of the greatest offensive and defensive fighting machines ever conceived" (McDowell, *Resurrection*, p.55). Further, a Roman soldier falling asleep on duty would be punished by death (McDowell, *Evidence*, p.213).

Jesus' Empty Tomb:

Despite the above precautions, on Sunday morning following the crucifixion, Jesus' tomb was empty. Again, all four Gospel writers record this fact (Matt 28:6; Mark 16:6; Luke 24:5f; John 20:2).

Further, there was great excitement over bodies missing from tombs in Judea in the first half of the first century. This fact is known due to the discovery in Nazareth of a decree of Claudius (reigned 41-54 AD). It reads, "Ordinance of Caesar. It is my pleasure that graves and tombs remain perpetually undisturbed In case of violation I desire that the offender be sentenced to capital punishment on charge of violation of sepulchre" (Habermas, p.155).

The death penalty for grave robbing? Something must have happened in Israel to cause this kind of reaction from the emperor. Could it have been the missing body of Jesus and the subsequent preaching of the resurrection?

Records of the Resurrection:

Every Gospel describes appearances of Jesus to the disciples after He had been crucified (Matt 28; Mark 16; Luke 24; John 20;21).

Luke, in the Book of Acts, writes of Jesus and the apostles, "... to whom He also presented Himself alive after His suffering by many infallible proofs, being seen by them forty days and speaking of the things pertaining to the kingdom of God" (Acts 1:3). Paul also records a list of resurrection appearances in his first epistle to the Corinthians (1Cor 15:3-8). This passage is particularly important. It pre-dates the writing of the Gospels themselves. The epistle itself was written around 56 AD (Criswell, p.1622).

Preaching of the Resurrection:

The Book of Acts records the preaching activity of the apostles. It centered on the claim Jesus Christ had risen from the dead (Acts 2:22-36; 3:12-15; 10:34-43).

This preaching activity is confirmed by extra-biblical sources. Josephus states, (Arabic version) "They reported that he had appeared to them three days after his crucifixion and that he was alive" (quoted in Habermas, p.92).

Tacitus records, "But in spite of this temporary setback (the crucifixion) the deadly superstition had broken out afresh, not only in Judea, where it had started, but even in Rome" (Tacitus, p.365).

The Tacitus quote is also important in that it again confirms Luke. The Book of Acts records that the resurrection was first preached in Judea, more specifically Jerusalem (Acts 2). This is near the very place where Jesus had been crucified and buried (John 19:38-42).

Finally, the disciples were so convinced Jesus had risen, they continued to preach the resurrection despite persecution and martyrdom. Luke records the slaying of James the apostle (Acts 12:2).

Josephus describes the stoning of James the Just (Josephus, p.423). Clement, a disciple of the apostle Paul, wrote an epistle to the Corinthians about 95 AD (see Phil 4:3).

In the fifth chapter, Clement recounts the martyrdoms of Peter and Paul (Lightfoot, pp.3,59). John the apostle left a record of his own banishment in Revelation 1:9.

According to tradition, the other apostles were all also persecuted and martyred for the faith (Knechtle, p.116). This type of fortitude in men who formally forsook and denied Christ needs to be explained (Matt 26:56,69-75).

Growth of Early Church:

The preaching of the apostles met with great success. The Christian movement grew rapidly despite the persecution. This growth is recorded in Acts and verified by the previous quote by Tacitus.

Tacitus also adds detailed descriptions of the horrendous persecutions the early Christians suffered (pp.365f). These points are also mentioned by Suetonius (secretary to emperor Hadrian, 117-138 AD) and Pliny the Younger (Roman historian, 112 AD; Habermas, pp.89f,95)

Change in Day of Worship:

And finally, the early Christians moved their day of worship from Saturday to Sunday. The Church was initially exclusively Jewish. At that time, Jews had been worshipping on Saturday for 14 centuries. Something dramatic must have happened on a Sunday to cause this change in a centuries long tradition.

Alternate Theories

Numerous alternative theories to the bodily resurrection of Jesus Christ have been proposed over the centuries. They all attempt to explain what actually happened in 30 AD in Judea without appealing to the miraculous.

This article will evaluate some of the more important of these theories.

A) _____ :

The **first alternative theory** to look at is the oldest. It is recorded in the Gospel of Matthew 28:11-15. Here, the soldiers guarding the tomb are bribed by the chief priests to say, "His disciples came at night and stole Him away while we slept" (Matt. 28:13).

Paul Little comments, "That story is so obviously false that Matthew doesn't even bother to refute it! ... Who knows what goes on while he's asleep? Testimony like this would be laughed out of any court" (Little, p.25).

There are several other points which also don't hold up in this theory. First, how would the disciples have moved the stone without waking the guard?

Second, John records that the linens used to wrap the body were still in the grave (John 20:5-7). Why would grave robbers have taken the time to unwrap the body?

Third, it is very unlikely all of the 4-16 men comprising a Roman guard would fall asleep. Remember, a Roman soldier falling asleep on the job would be executed. And if they were awake, they could have easily stopped the apostles. "The soldiers were a trained fighting unit. One soldier could have easily dealt with the entire group of disciples" (McDowell, *Resurrection*, p.93).

Fourth, if the disciples had stolen the body, then they would have all been persecuted and killed for something they knew was a lie. "Men will die for what they believe to be true, though it may actually be false. They do not however, die for what they know is a lie" (Little, p.25).

Fifth, this theory doesn't account for the resurrection appearances of Jesus. The NT records that He appeared to over 500 people following His death (1Cor 15:6). So this theory breaks down at every point.

A variant of this theory is the proposal the Romans or Jews were the thieves. But "Why would the authorities do the very thing that caused all their problems?" (McDowell, *Resurrection*, p.95). Neither the Romans nor the Jews had any motive to steal the body.

B)

This theory is the women in their grief went to the wrong tomb and everyone else followed suit. But Matthew records that during Jesus' burial, "Mary Magdalene was there, and the other Mary, sitting opposite the tomb" (Matt 27:61)

To suggest that two women sat and watched a Man who had been very important to them being buried and then two days later to forget where He was buried stretches credulity.

Also, John states that he and Peter ran to the tomb immediately after being told by the women that they had seen Jesus (John 20:1-4).

They did not follow the women. So John and Peter would have also had to have been mistaken about where their Master had been buried. Further, if they had gone to the wrong tomb, why was there empty linen clothes lying on the floor of the tomb? (John 20:5-8).

Further, Jesus had been buried very near to where He had been crucified (John 19:38-42). So "... why did the high priests and other enemies of the faith not go to the right tomb and produce the body?" (Little, p.26).

And again, this theory doesn't account for the resurrection appearances.

C)

To answer the question of the resurrection appearances, the hallucination theory has been put forth. The idea is the disciples wanted to see Jesus alive so much they only imagined seeing Him. This theory also breaks down on several counts.

First, the followers of Jesus were NOT expecting to see Jesus alive again. "Mary came to the tomb on the first Easter Sunday morning with spices...to anoint the dead body of Jesus" (Little, p.30; see Mark 16:1).

Moreover, "Christ's followers were caused to believe against their wills" (McDowell, *Evidence*, p.253). Thomas said, "Unless I shall see in His hands the print of the nails, and put my finger into the print of the nails, and put my hand into His side, I will not believe" (John 20:25; see also Luke 24:10-12, 24).

Second, it wasn't only Jesus' followers who later preached the resurrection. James and Paul were initially skeptics; but they both became believers as a result of Jesus' appearance to them (1Cor 15:7f).

Third, the resurrection appearances occurred in a wide variety of settings, to people of varying temperaments at different times. However, hallucinations, "... are very individualistic. It is very unlikely that two persons would have the same hallucination at

the same time" (McDowell, *Evidence*, p.249). And it is even less likely 500 would have the same hallucination or different people at different times.

Fourth, "Hallucinations usually occur over a long period of time with noticeable regularity" (McDowell, *Resurrection*, p.86). After the ascension, the appearances stopped except for the one to Paul several years later; but he makes it clear that this appearance was exceptional (1Cor. 15:8).

Lastly, this theory doesn't account for the empty tomb. To try to combine this theory with the stolen body theory will not do. Both theories break down on several points, not just one or two.

D)

This theory states that Jesus never really died. Instead, it is claimed, He just swooned on the cross and in the coolness of the tomb revived.

First, "This is a theory of modern construction All of the earliest records are emphatic about Jesus death" (Little, pp.26f). Keep in mind, the Koran was not written until 600 years after the time of Christ; whereas, the Gospels were all written in the first century.

Second, remember the story of Josephus' three friends? After hanging on crosses for only a short time, they were taken down. Yet, even with medical attention, two of the three still died.

Compare this situation with that of Jesus. Jesus was scourged before He was crucified (Matt 27:26). Before being taken down, He had been on the cross for six hours and had a sword shoved in His side (Mark 15:25,33; John 19:34). Jesus was then laid alone in a tomb and a guard placed outside (Matt 27:57-65).

Given the cruelty of Roman crucifixion and these added difficulties:
Is it possible to believe that he would have survived three days in a damp tomb without food or water or attention of any kind? Would he have survived being wound in spice-laden grave clothes? Would he have had the strength to extricate himself from the grave clothes, push the heavy stone away from the mouth of the grave, overcome the Roman guards, and walk miles on feet that had been pierced with spikes? (Little, p.27).

After all this, are we to believe, "He could appear to the disciples in such a way as to give them the impression that he vanquished death?" (McDowell, *Evidence*, p.234). "Finally, if Christ did not die at this time, then when did He die and under what circumstances?" (McDowell, *Islam*, p.124). All records of the life of Jesus from the time end with the ascension.

E)

Some orthodox Muslims have proposed, "...God made someone else look like Jesus and

Subsequently, the eleven prominent Galilean disciples and others began propagating the incredible message that Jesus had risen from the dead. Christianity was born (Babcock, p.245).

This theory suffers from several of the same problems as previous ones. What about the empty tomb that was being watched by a Roman guard?

How could the disciples have spent 3 1/2 years, day and night, with Jesus and then mistake someone else for him? How could the unknown man appear through locked doors and disappear at will? How could Jesus, who taught honesty and integrity His entire ministry, have involved Himself in such a deliberate, attempted deception? As with the other theories, Schonfield rejects a large part of the known facts and only accepts the few points that fit his theory. It seems his own preconceived ideas and vivid imagination are utilized in developing this theory rather than historical fact.

G)

This suggestion is the apostle Paul merely utilized the prevailing beliefs of the mystery religions and gnosticism of his time and adapted their concepts of a dying and risen savior into his preaching.

First, this idea simply ignores all the known historical facts discussed previously in this paper.

Second, "In the case of the alleged mythical parallels ... the evidence suggests that the Gnostic redeemer myth does not predate the writing of the Gospels" (Blomberg, p.101). Further, "... all extant manuscripts with Redeemer Hymns are from AD 140 or later -- while Hymns of Philippians and 1 Timothy can be dated no later than the first century AD" (see Phil 2:5-11; 1Tim 3:16; Nash, p.228).

Third, "Aside from this weighty chronological consideration ... there are major differences in content between the Christian and Gnostic hymns" (Nash, p.228). The redeemer hymns have the god dying and rising annually (Nash, p.140). This cycle was usually in conjunction with the rebirth of spring (Blomberg, p.101). However, the Bible presents Jesus as dying only once and rising only once (Heb 9:24-28).

Lastly, it is doubtful that the redeemer myths actually record a bodily resurrection. "One can speak of a 'resurrection' in the stories of Osiris, Attis and Adonis only in the most extended of senses" (Nash, p.173).

H)

The last proposal to study is the most radical of the theories. It simply claims that Paul made up the whole idea of a crucified and risen Jesus because he thought it was a good idea.

This theory was suggested in the controversial movie of the late 1980's, "The Last Temptation of Christ". During the dream episode (while Jesus is on the cross), the following dialogue occurs between Jesus and Paul:

Jesus: I was never crucified, I never came back from the dead. I'm a man like everyone else. Why are you telling these lies...?

Paul: I don't care whether you're Jesus or not, the resurrected Jesus will save the world and that's what matters I created the truth out of what people needed and what they believed. If I have to crucify you to save the world, then I'll crucify you. And if I have to resurrect you, then I'll do that too, whether you like it or not (quoted in Ankerberg, p.34f).

This scene obviously ignores ALL the known facts. As with *The Passover Plot* and Schonfield, the producers of "The Last Temptation" are suggesting a rewriting of history in accordance with their preconceived ideas. There is no historical evidence supporting their proposal. And remember, Paul was beheaded for preaching this story he supposedly just "made up."

Summary:

Eight alternate theories have been investigated. All have been found wanting. None of them comes even close to explaining ALL of the known facts. All have logical and historical problems.

There are probably others that have been proposed over the centuries that have not been covered here. And most likely, even more will be put forth as time goes by. But all of these theories seem to have several things in common:

- 1) They start with the assumption that a miracle did not occur.
- 2) They always have to ignore at least some historical facts.
- 3) History is rewritten in accordance with the inventor's preconceptions.
- 4) The authors all seem to have very vivid imaginations.

LESSON # 21
RESURRECTION: Cornerstone of Christianity

Christ Has in Fact Risen!

So what actually happened in 30 AD? There is only one theory which avoids all of the pitfalls mentioned above. It is the theory that has been around since the beginning of Christianity. In fact, it is what founded the Christian faith.

Former skeptic Josh McDowell explains:

After investigating the major alternative theories proposed, only one conclusion takes into account all the facts and does not adjust them to preconceived notions. It is the conclusion that CHRIST HAS IN FACT RISEN – a supernatural act of God in history (McDowell, *Resurrection*, p.102).

Ramifications:

This conclusion has profound ramifications. The resurrection is a Divine vindication of the words and actions of Jesus. Jesus said that the purpose of His crucifixion would be "... to give His life a ransom for many" (Matt 20:28).

At the Last Supper, Jesus "... took the cup, and gave thanks, and gave it to them, saying, 'Drink from it, all of you. For this is My blood of the new covenant, which is shed for many for the remission of sins'" (Matt 26:27f).

Just before He died on the cross, Jesus cried out, "It is finished!" (John 19:30). What had been finished was all that is needed for the forgiveness of sin and attainment of eternal salvation. Jesus' resurrection three days later demonstrated that God had in fact accepted Jesus' death as the all-sufficient sacrifice (Rom 4:25; Heb 2:17; 9:24-28; 10:14).

HOW TO RECEIVE JESUS

1) Don't get _____ get _____. The first step is not about churches, personalities or organizations. It's about getting right with God. After that God can place you in a fellowship of believers where you can grow.

2) Don't judge Christ by _____. Christians are just people. Leaders fall and fail, but you don't hear that much about the ones who serve God faithfully, never cheat on their wives or husbands, never get in trouble. Believe me, these far outnumber the ones you hear about. Billy Graham is a phenomenon to have been so faithful and well known with never a hint of scandal. Get your eyes off of men, and look to God for your answers. If you approach Him with an honest, questioning heart, He will satisfy your need to know. (Seek and you will find....)

3) Don't wait to _____ before you get right with God. This is a "come-as-you-are" party. Jesus loves you right where you are. It's only he who can affect real change in your life, because real change only comes from the inside out. Our attempts at self-improvement usually are usually working from the opposite premise, and that kind of change seldom works, and NEVER works on the eternal level.

4) Don't make the mistake of thinking that you are _____. The Bible says that "when we repent, He is faithful and just to forgive, and cleanse us from ALL unrighteousness. If you are truly repentant, there is nothing that cannot be forgiven. Jesus loves YOU, no matter what your past.

5) Don't think that if you become a Christian, that you won't have fun anymore. Hollywood, TV, books etc., have in general painted Christianity to be something for a bunch of losers.. dried up prunes of people who have lost their zest for life. Not true. God will change your mind about what you think is fun, but true Christians have real joy in their lives and really know what real fun is. I'm glad the days of partying down and "having fun" without remembering what happened to me because I was passed out are over. What kind of fun is that?

Let's move along, with a few more facts to consider:

1) Everyone in the world has missed God, and needs to be saved. No matter who you are, without Jesus in your life, you are lost. No matter how good a life you may lead, you are lost without Christ. Men have fallen from godliness and need to have relationship with God restored, which can only happen through the cross of Calvary.

2) Your salvation cannot be earned. This is something God has done for us, we can't earn it, we must just receive it.

3) Your salvation cannot be learned. You don't need to go to Bible school to be saved. Wouldn't it be unfair if only theologically literate people could get right with God? No, God made this so simple that a 10 year old child can receive Jesus as savior. He truly made it so simple that "the foolishness of God would confound the wisdom of the world." It's a matter of faith, not intellect.

4) You must recognize your need. You ARE a foul depraved Godless person, as we all were before receiving Jesus. Even the good things you do have a selfish agenda if you really be honest. You must be willing to call sin, and turn from it, change your lifestyle completely, pick up your cross and follow Him. Difficult club to join, you say? Yes, and I want you to know it isn't always pretty. It's losing your life for His sake that you may gain it back. It's suffering sometimes because you do the right thing. It's not easy. Don't join if you're looking for an easy way. Yet, at the same time this life is filled with joy and satisfaction. Think of the life that Jesus led. Full of suffering, rejection and pain, and yet Jesus was the happiest most well-adjusted person who ever lived, because He did it God's way..

5) You must receive Him by faith. You won't know all the answers, you may not even have thought of many of the questions. It's a matter of knowing in your heart that what Jesus said is right, then acting on it.

What did Jesus say?

1) "I am the way, the truth, the life. No man shall see the Father if not through me. He didn't say, as many gurus and spiritual leaders do that He knew a way to get truth, He said He WAS the way the truth, the life. He also said He was the ONLY way. (A hard one for a lot of people, but I didn't say it, HE did.)

2) They that call upon the name of the Lord shall be saved. Self explanatory.

So.. How do I receive Him?

It's so simple you may have a hard time believing it. No costly seminars to attend, no years spent in Bible school, only a simple prayer of faith.

Here are the steps, (not a formula, but steps)

1) Repent. Recognize your sinfulness and turn from your ways. Be willing to change what needs to be changed.

2) Receive His forgiveness. He died on the cross so that you may be forgiven. Your forgiveness was purchased 2000 years ago. Receive it now.

3) Don't wait for a bolt of lightning. Most conversion experiences are not dramatic. You may or may not experience an emotional release, it doesn't matter, we walk by faith, not sight.

4) Pray words to this effect: "Jesus, I need you in my life. I've not been tremendously successful without you, and so now I'm going to try it your way. I repent of every wrong thing I've ever done, and receive the forgiveness that You offer. I believe that You are God, and that you died on the cross and rose from death to conquer all the works of darkness. I surrender my life to You this day, and pledge to do my best to be obedient to You from this day forth. You have made me a new creation, and I am now "born again" of the Spirit of God. Because of You, I will go to heaven when I die. I pray all this in the Name of Jesus."

What now?

1) Go tell somebody! "If you confess Me before men, I will confess you before my father. I'd love for you to let ME know. E-mail me, or fax me, or whatever, I'd love to hear what God did for you.

2) Get a Bible.. Read it a little every day.

3) Go to church! *"Don't forsake the assembling of yourselves together."* God's got a home for you.

4) Pray daily. Talk conversationally to God. The Spirit that is within you will put you in touch with Him. He does speak to us today, but you have to learn how to hear His voice.

5) Get baptized.

This is a difficult question and one that obviously bring up a lot of _____ and _____.

Two of the Bible verses that deal directly with are:

John 14:6

Jesus answered, "I am the way and the truth and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me."

Acts 4:12

“Salvation is found in no one else, for there is no other name under heaven given to men by which we must be saved.”

These passages are pretty clear and pretty direct. Jesus says He is the only way, and Acts says there is no other name by which we must be saved.

We’ll come back to these scriptures, but let’s examine the question and try and understand what people are saying about the issue and ask some big questions.

(I) IT SEEMS _____ BUT IT’S NOT _____

A) If God is a loving God and loves all people wouldn’t it make sense that all religions that claim to know God would make to God, including participating in an afterlife with Him forever?

B) There have make many explanations and analogies to explain how this works. Here’s one of the more popular:

Have a student read this to everyone.

THE BLIND MEN AND THE _____

This is answer comes a Sikh (Sikhs are a religion from India) parable from told a number of different ways, but goes something like this. Somebody from a balcony sees a group of blind men trying to understand and elephant. One grabs the tail and says it’s “like a rope.” One feels the side and concludes the elephant is “like a wall.” One feels the legs and concludes “it’s like a tree.” One feels the trunk and says, “it’s like snake.”

The idea here is that all humans are living in relative darkness, groping around, trying to figure out life and understand God. The conclusion is that “all religions bring a piece of understanding to the table.”

The parable at first seems to make sense, but breaks down in the end.

- (a) It never tells us the truth about what an elephant is.
- (b) An elephant is not, part tree, part snake, part wall.
- (c) The parable fails to ever tell us who God is, what He is like or how He would be worshipped.

WHAT OTHER LESSONS CAN WE DERIVE FROM THIS ILLUSTRATION?

(II) THERE ARE SOME RELIGIONS THAT HAVE _____ GODS

A) In Hinduism some have estimated there are as many as _____. Other say there are only 33 in Hinduism, others say that one god has given rise to the other gods.

Have a student read Colossians 1:6

For by him all things were created: things in heaven and on earth, visible and invisible, whether thrones or powers or rulers or authorities; all things were created by him and for him.

Have another student read John 1:3

“Through him all things were made; without him nothing was made that has been made.”

(III) DO ALL RELIGIONS SHARE THE SAME _____ OF GOD?

A) Surprisingly the answer is “No.” While to most people it seems all ‘religions’ promote peace, harmony, love and equality, it’s not true that all religions embrace the same values or attitudes towards life and lifestyles.

War, poverty, human rights, women’s rights are seen by various religions are not the same. Varna in Hinduism regulates people into certain ‘castes.’ How and to whom people are born determines these castes, which can rather distressing and paralyzing if you are born into a royal or “untouchable” caste. Since these castes, which often determine your lifelong work and economic status are determined by God, you cannot change them or move to another.

B) How women are viewed in different religions can be quite different. Islam in Saudi Arabia does not allow women to drive cars.

(IV) CONCLUSIONS AND DIGGER DEEPER

While it might be comforting to think that it does not matter which God you serve and worship, it simply isn’t logical. Logic means, “The proper or reasonable way of thinking about something.”

DISCUSS THE FOLLOWING SCRIPTURES TOGETHER

□ **1 Timothy 2:5-6** For there is only one God and one Mediator who can reconcile God and humanity—the man Christ Jesus. He gave his life to purchase freedom for everyone. This is the message God gave to the world at just the right time.

□ **1 John 2:23** Anyone who denies the Son doesn’t have the Father, either. But anyone who acknowledges the Son has the Father also.

□ **1 John 5:10-12** All who believe in the Son of God know in their hearts that this testimony is true. Those who don’t believe this are actually calling God a liar because they don’t believe what God has testified about his Son. And this is what God has testified: He has given us eternal life, and this life is in his Son. Whoever has the Son has

life; whoever does not have God's Son does not have life.

□ **1 John 5:20** And we know that the Son of God has come, and he has given us understanding so that we can know the true God. And now we live in fellowship with the true God because we live in fellowship with his Son, Jesus Christ. He is the only true God, and he is eternal life.

□ **Matthew 11:27** "My Father has entrusted everything to me. No one truly knows the Son except the Father, and no one truly knows the Father except the Son and those to whom the Son chooses to reveal him."

□ **Acts 4:12** There is salvation in no one else! God has given no other name under heaven by which we must be saved (JESUS)."

□ **John 14:6** Jesus told him, "I am the way, the truth, and the Life. No one can come to the Father except through Me.

□ **Hebrews 5:8-9** Even though Jesus was God's Son, he learned obedience from the things he suffered. In this way, God qualified him as a perfect High Priest, and he became the source of eternal salvation for all those who obey him.

□ **John 1:11-12** He came to his own people, and even they rejected him. But to all who believed him and accepted him, he gave the right to become children of God.

HARD QUESTIONS SERIES
“DOES THE BIBLE CONTRADICT ITSELF?”

This is perhaps one of the most frequently asked questions and one of the most common charges about the Bible. Many times when asked Christians who believe the Bible will simply answer, “No,” which is the right answer, but might not be taking into consideration why people are asking the question.

The most common reason people say, “the Bible is full of contradictions is because _____” The most common defense is to say, “it doesn’t have any contradictions,” but not knowing how to explain it.

The facts are that most people who say there are contradictions and those who say there are not have never examined the issue or the scriptures that are supposedly contradictions.

Anybody that is a serious student of the Bible will have to admit that there seem to be contradictions in the Bible. But are there any? Let look honestly at the question and some of the scriptures that supposedly contradict themselves.

(I) LET’S DEFINE WHAT A _____ IS

A) The dictionary says:

1) The act of saying something that is _____ or _____ in meaning to something else

2) A difference or disagreement between two things which means both cannot be true.

B) Using these definitions statements like, “President John F Kennedy was shot and died in Dallas in 1964” and “I just saw John F Kennedy talking on television, he is still alive” would be a contradiction.

C) To say “It is raining outside up to an inch and hour,” and “It’s not raining out, it’s a beautiful, clear day” would be contradictions.

D) Can you think of some contradictions? List some.

E) The ‘law of _____’ says something cannot be “A” and “not-A” at the same time.

F) If a violation of this principle could be found in the scriptures it would be a problem, If the Bible said Jesus would be born in Bethlehem and somewhere else that Jesus would be

born in Jerusalem, that would be a problem and a contradiction. It cannot be both at the same time.

(II) WHAT A _____ IS NOT

A) It is possible for there to be two different accounts or _____ of the same incident, event or situation without it being a contradiction.

B) We need to see that a “_____” is not necessarily a “contradiction.”

Let’s examine what some might call a “contradiction”

C) Recognizing “a difference” is not necessarily “a contradiction.”

- What ‘difference’ do you notice in these accounts?

- Just because an account is “different” and does not include all the same details, does not make it a contradiction. We often in our own lives will share about experiences different than others who experienced it with us.

- If one of eth accounts would have said the men were not blind at all, that would be a contradiction. They simply choose to share some details others do not.

D) Some say the account of Judas hanging himself is contradicted in the scriptures. Preston Sprinkle, in a article for Relevant Magazine explains it this way:

Matthew 27:5 says that Judas hung himself, while Acts 1:18 says that he fell to the ground and burst wide open. These are two *different* accounts of Judas’ death, but they are not formal contradictions. A contradiction would be one passages saying, “Judas hung himself and died” and another passage saying, “Judas *didn’t* hang himself; rather, he threw himself from cliff and splattered on the ground.”

In the Bible, it could be that he hung himself in a high tree, and then the rope snapped and he fell headlong and burst all over the ground. Or maybe his attempt at hanging himself didn’t work (Matthew 27 doesn’t actually say he died from hanging himself), and so he went and threw himself from a cliff, as recorded in Acts.

E) There is a _____ that we have four different Gospels by Matthew, Mark, Luke and John. These are four different viewpoints of the same life and the same events. Sometimes they are almost exactly the same, sometimes there are subtle differences, sometimes what one includes the other writer does not. These are not ‘contradictions’ they are simply ‘different’ than each other. Many of the ‘so-called contradictions’ can be answered this way.

F) ANOTHER EXAMPLE. What was written on the cross? Some would say the Bible contradicts itself here, as each Gospel says something different.

“And above His head they put up the charge against Him which read, ‘THIS IS JESUS THE KING OF THE JEWS’.” Matthew 27:37

“The inscription of the charge against Him read, ‘THE KING OF THE JEWS’.”
Mark 15:26

“Now there was also an inscription above Him, ‘THIS IS THE KING OF THE JEWS’.”
Luke 23:38

“Pilate also wrote an inscription and put it on the cross. It was written, ‘JESUS THE NAZARENE, THE KING OF THE JEWS’.”
John 19:19

G) Preston Sprinkle gives another example with how numbers are used in the scripture. The Bible writers wrote and talked, not unlike the way we write and talk. When we say things like, “I’ll see you in an hour,” do we mean in exactly sixty minute, to the second we will see you? Or do we mean in about an hour, and everybody understands this to be so? The Bible is no different.

Speaking of this Sprinkle says, “*For instance, 1 Chronicles 21:5 says that Judah had 470,000 valiant soldiers while the parallel in 2 Samuel 24:9 says they had 500,000. Is this a contradiction? Not if you read the passage according to the normal rules of language. We don’t demand such precision in our daily speech; we round up or round down, and no one accuses us of lying.*”

- 2) God stands outside of the creation. He is not part of the creation. He is the Creator. He can break in at any time and do anything He wants.
- 3) A miracle is “a divine intervention” into the regular course of the world

“ISN’T CHRISTIANITY AND RELIGION RESPONSIBLE FOR MOST WARS?”

Contrary to popular belief and a charge that is leveled against Christianity, Most wars are not religious wars. Sam Harris, in his book *The End of Faith* that faith and religion are “the most prolific source of violence in our history.” Richard Dawkins has put it this way: “Religion causes war by generating certainty”. They are both plain, flat out, wrong!




(II) _____ AND THE _____ BEAR OUT THAT RELIGION IS NOT THE CAUSE MOST WARS

On the contrary, only a small percentage of wars have a religious context, and Islam accounts for the largest number of those.

Robin Schumacher and Matt Slick have compiled some interesting statistics about wars and their origin.

“An interesting source of truth on the matter is Philip and Axelrod’s three-volume *Encyclopedia of Wars*, which chronicles some 1,763 wars that have been waged over the course of human history. Of those wars, the authors categorize 123 as being religious in nature, which is an astonishingly low 6.98% of all wars. However, when one subtracts out those waged in the name of Islam (66), the percentage is cut by more than half to 3.23%.”



That means that all faiths combined – minus Islam – have caused less than 4% of all of humanity’s wars and violent conflicts. Further, they played no motivating role in the major wars that have resulted in the most loss of life.

Hideki Tojo - 3,990,000 (Japan 1880s – 1940s)

Pol Pot - 2,397,000³ (Cambodia 1930s – 1990s)

Rummel says: “Almost 170 million men, women and children have been shot, beaten, tortured, knifed, burned, starved, frozen, crushed or worked to death; buried alive, drowned, hung, bombed or killed in any other of a myriad of ways governments have inflicted death on unarmed, helpless citizens and foreigners. The dead could conceivably be nearly 360 million people. It is though our species has been devastated by a modern Black Plague. And indeed it has, but a plague of Power, not germs.”⁴

How Cohabiting Today Can Ruin Your Life Tomorrow

Estimates vary as to how many people in America are cohabiting together (there is no way to actually know), but figures from the US Census Bureau show that there are over five million cohabiting people in the United States. As the graph above from USA Today shows, the numbers have been radically increasing over the last several decades. In the 1960's less than 5% of women lived with a man before they got married. In the opening years of the new millennium it is estimated that as many as 70% of women have lived with a man before they get married. But is cohabiting good? Is it good for you, and if not, why?

The simple answer is that God told us not to live in sexual relationships outside of committed marriage. Some think this is rather prudish, old fashioned and unenlightened. But recent research and studies have concluded--as usual--that God knew what he was talking about when he gave us the boundaries for successful living.

COHABITING MEN ARE LESS LIKELY TO BE COMMITTED AFTER GETTING MARRIED Psychology Today in its June 14, 2005 issue, reported a study by Scott Stanley of the Center for Marriage and Family Studies at the University of Denver. The study showed that men who lived with their spouses before marriage were on the average less committed to their marriages than those who did not. The bad news is that women tended to be just as committed as those who did not cohabit. So in the cohabiting relationship, *if* it ends in marriage, there is a strong possibility that the woman will be more committed to the relationship than the man. That's plain awful!

COUPLES WHO HAVE COHABITED BEFORE MARRIAGE CONSISTENTLY HAVE HIGHER DIVORCE RATES THAN THOSE WHO DON'T A frequently-cited source for this is a study by Pennsylvania State University researchers that appeared in 2002 in the Journal of Marriage and Family. Numerous studies have been pointing this out for many years. The fact is, living together before marriage is not healthy for the relationship and brings with it a much higher probability of the relationship breaking up *if* it ends in marriage.

LIVING TOGETHER DOES NOT NECESSARY LEAD TO STAYING TOGETHER Many of those who cohabit will cohabit again. How many people do you want to live with over the course of your lifetime? How many hopes do you want shattered? How many promises to you do you want broken? Stay away from cohabiting. It is not good for your relational or emotional health.

COHABITING COUPLES ARE MORE PRONE TO CHEAT ON EACH OTHER Well, duh! Our antennae should go up whenever anybody is hesitant to make a commitment to us. What are they afraid of anyway? "Well I don't want to

be tied down.” “Then, goodbye!” Preserve your dignity. You are worth a commitment. Studies show that cohabiting couples are more prone to cheating on each other than married couples. But we already know that from being alive and being around people. Spare yourself the pain. If he or she won’t commit, split!

WHAT ABOUT CHILDREN AND COHABITING? It goes without explaining that this is a very difficult situation for children. It unnecessarily complicates their lives and leaves them insecure when the adults around them should be adding, not taking away from, stability in their lives.
